The department	The department of Neurosurgery provides a comprehensive secondary care core service for the local community.
	We are also tertiary referral centre for Neurosurgery for West Midlands.
The type of work to expect and learning opportunities	The post-holder will provide support for patients in the ward 407/409/outlier, helping to prepare patients for surgery and managing them post operatively. They will also help in the management of the emergency caseload.
	Daily duties can typically include ward rounds, booking outpatient appointments upon discharge & emailing secretaries, theatre lists, TTO's, taking bloods and cannulas.
	There is a strong research theme in the department giving post-holder many opportunities to explore academic medicine if they wish.

Supervisor(s) for the placement	Over the period of your placement, you will be working with a number of Consultants all of whom can provide clinical supervision during the time you are on duty with them. However, you will be assigned a specific named Clinical supervisor for the placement and a named Educational Supervisor for the year.
Main duties of the placement	The main duties of the placement is to support the more senior doctors in the department on the ward rounds and ensure the patient management plans are attended to. Once these duties are complete the post holder will be encouraged to take advantage of the wealth of clinical experiences available to them within the department.
Typical working pattern in this placement	There are daily business ward rounds every morning and a review round in the evening.
