Individual Placement Description – Queen Elizabeth Hospital Birmingham

Placement	FY1 Stroke Medicine (with Acute Medicine on calls)
The department	The Stroke Unit has 36 beds on a shared medical ward lead by three Stroke Consultants and supported by two Stroke Neurologists. The ward work is split into three teams: There is one ward registrar, and 6 to 8 juniors (FY1s, FY2s, CTs) who rotate each week between teams depending on who is on-call.
The type of work to expect and learning opportunities	 Ward days: typically 8am to 4pm. Ward rounds are run by consultants on most days, and by juniors on occasion with senior support. Ward jobs including family discussions, coordinating speciality reviews and basic practical skills. Work as part of a stroke medicine MDT team with experience of complex hyper-acute stroke patients and their rehabilitation Provision of medical care to older inpatients. On-call: Acute medical unit: experience of Acute Medicine with long days (9am until 9pm) and nights shifts. Shifts include clerking in medical patients and ward cover on the Acute Medical Unit. Ward cover: evening and night shifts covering the medical wards. Weekly specialty teaching/journal club/case presentations Weekly stroke ward -based teaching Monthly audit/clinical governance meeting Half day alternate week FY1 teaching Weekly Grand Round Excellent support structure for Foundation trainees Career support Bi monthly junior doctor FY1 forums 3 days of self development time per rotation
Where the placement is based	Queen Elizabeth Hospital – ward 514, new building
Supervisor(s) for the placement	Over the period of your placement, you will be working with a number of Consultants all of whom can provide clinical supervision during the time you are on duty with them. However, you will be assigned a specific named Clinical supervisor for the placement and a named Educational Supervisor for the year.
Main duties of the placement	 Ward based management of 12 stroke/geriatric/general medical patients Work closely with physiotherapists, SALT and OT regarding rehabilitation and discharge targets. Discharge plans as appropriate including to rehabilitation hospitals. Clerking of new stroke patients once they arrive on wards or in ED under the supervision of the stroke consultant of the day. Daily ward round, also daily review of new patients. Performing practical skills including venepuncture, cannulation and catheterisation.
