Individual Placement Description – Queen Elizabeth Hospital Birmingham

Placement	FY2 Genito-urinary medicine (Post 1)
The department	Genito-urinary medicine (GU Medicine)
	University Hospital Birmingham is the lead partner in Umbrella Sexual Health - the pan-Birmingham and Solihull Sexual Health Service. Umbrella is the largest sexual health service in the UK with 15 consultants in GU Medicine and Reproductive and Sexual Health, and seeing more than 100,000 new patient contacts per year.
	The Department of GU Medicine is based at the purpose-built Whittall Street Clinic in Birmingham city centre, which is the hub of the Umbrella Sexual health service. Clinics are also delivered in 6 other satellite locations across Birmingham and Solihull including a clinic in Boots, Birmingham City Centre. In addition services are delivered through pharmacists city wide and in conjunction with GP's and community organisations.
	The department strives to be a national centre of excellence but also provides a supportive and welcoming environment for junior staff. It has consistently been rated very highly on clinical supervision, protected learning time and diverse, hands-on clinical experience by previous foundation trainees.
	University Hospital Birmingham also runs the largest service for the care of HIV-infected patients in the West Midlands region. The HIV service is based at the new Queen Elizabeth Hospital and Birmingham Heartlands Hospital.
The type of work to expect and learning opportunities	This post is based at the Whittall Street Clinic. The post holder will have ample clinical exposure to genito-urinary medicine at Whittall Street Clinic, as well as its satellite community clinics at <i>Boots</i> in Birmingham city centre. During the 4 month placement with us you will have the opportunity to: • Work independently in GU clinics offering full STI screening
	 including HIV testing. Learn the importance of open and non-judgemental attitudes, and gain communication and time management skills
	Become proficient in male and female genital examinations
	Gain experience in ethical and medico-legal issues eg confidentiality, underage sexual activity, safeguarding children and vulnerable adults

Clinical Supervisor(s) for the placement	Over the period of your placement, you will be working with a number of Consultants all of whom can act as your clinical supervisor during the time you are on duty with them. You will be assigned a named clinical supervisor for each placement and a specific Educational Supervisor for the year.
Main duties of the placement	 Recognise, diagnose and treat all sexually transmitted infections (including syphilis) and many other genital conditions. Advise on and prescribe PEP (post exposure prophylaxis) following potential HIV exposure and PrEP (pre-exposure prophylaxis) for the prevention of HIV Microbiology sampling and specimen preparation for on-site laboratory. Counselling for all contraceptive methods including LARCs and provision of short acting contraceptive methods and emergency contraception.
