The department	In the Queen Elizabeth Hospital Birmingham, Geriatric Medicine has 94 beds organised across 4 specialist Healthcare for Older People (HCOP) wards. There are 10 substantive Consultant Geriatricians and 2 locum Consultants Physicians with specific responsibility for a team or ward.
The type of work to expect and learning opportunities	 Provision of medical care to older inpatients under consultant supervision; assessment & admission of medical patients as part of the General Internal Medicine (GIM) on-call team. Work as part of a geriatric medicine team with experience of frail, multi-morbid older adults Experience of Acute Medicine with regular shifts on the Acute Medical Unit (AMU) Experience of night shifts (acute take and /or Hospital@Night) Weekly specialty teaching/ journal club/ case presentations Monthly audit/ clinical governance/ morbidity and mortality meeting Weekly Clinical Grand Round Excellent support structure for Foundation trainees Supervision & support to FY1 colleagues. Where the placement is based	Queen Elizabeth Hospital Heritage Building - Healthcare for Older People wards Base ward will be one of Harborne/ Edgbaston/ East 2 A/ East 2 B
Supervisor(s) for the placement	Over the period of your placement, you will be working with a number of Consultants all of whom can provide clinical supervision during the time you are on duty with them. However, you will be assigned a specific named Clinical Supervisor for the placement and a named Educational Supervisor for the year.
Main duties of the placement	 Consultant-led ward round five days a week (Mon – Fri) with opportunity to do independent ward rounds as an educational activity. Consultant supported weekend ward cover – new admissions, unwell patients, patients for discharge, other queries Typical daily tasks can include ward rounds, clinical skills, liaison with wider multidisciplinary team and relatives, TTO's and discharge letters. Assessment of the acutely unwell patient on the wards and on-call in the Acute



	 Medical Unit and Emergency Department. Liaising with the multidisciplinary team regarding discharge planning and development of the skills required to lead the weekly multidisciplinary team meetings Discussions with family members regarding discharge planning. All F1 core procedures, as appropriate Typical patient issues you can expect to see: patients presenting with delirium, chronic cognitive impairment, falls, complex multi-morbidity, older adults living with frailty, patients approaching the end of life, palliative care. In AMU you can expect to encounter patients with common acute medical presentations.
