Individual Placement Description – Queen Elizabeth Hospital Birmingham

Placement	FY2 Haematology
The department	Within the haematology department the specialist medical and nursing-staff operate the haematology ward and the day unit, outpatient clinics, the bone marrow transplant unit and the West Midlands adult comprehensive care haemophilia centre. In addition the service hosts the West Midlands regional integrated diagnostic service for haematologic malignancies and provides haematology laboratory and transfusion service for patients with complex needs. It is a regional referral centre for haematology, teenage and young adult cancer patients and bone marrow transplants, providing complex care for adults with haematological malignancy. The haemostasis, consultative haematology and transfusion service provides a comprehensive investigative and management service for patients with a range of non malignant haematological disorders and advises on patients under the care of other speciality teams. The day unit provides facilities at the Queen Elizabeth Hospital Birmingham for day cases, plasma exchange and bone marrow harvesting.
The type of work to expect and learning opportunities	 Day to day management of patients with haematological malignancy Dealing with acute care of neutropenic sepsis Dealing with immunosuppressed patients Breaking bad news Palliative care Opportunity to spend time with the HCT team seeing patients with non malignant disorders and reviewing 'consults' around the hospital, and attend haematology outpatient clinics (during a dedicated week allocated during the post) Excellent level of support from SpRs and consultants, and close working with clinical nurse specialists Twice weekly consultant ward rounds Daily SpR ward round Attendance at weekly MDT Evening, weekend and night shifts (2 doctors covering haematology and oncology; F1 doctors will always be paired with a more senior doctor) Weekly Haematology Dept teaching (journal club, case reviews) every Tuesday afternoon Fortnightly teaching for F1, CMT and JSD doctors every Monday lunchtime, given by haematology consultants. Half day alternate week FY2 teaching Weekly Grand Round Excellent support structure for junior doctors with dedicated consultant team to supervise junior doctors Monthly Trust Foundation committee with trainee representation Bi monthly junior doctor FY2 forums 4 days of self development time per rotation

Supervisor(s) for the placement	Over the period of your placement, you will be working with a number of Consultants all of whom can provide clinical supervision during the time you are on duty with them. However, you will be assigned a specific named Clinical supervisor for the placement and a named Educational Supervisor for the year.
Main duties of the placement	 Clerking in new admissions, either elective for chemotherapy or bone marrow transplantation or an emergency admission of a patient who has previously had haematological treatment. Other typical daily duties include ward rounds, discharge letters, TTO's, bloods & cannulas, ordering scans and making referrals. Typical patient issues can include cancer side effects, chemotherapy side effects, general medical, sickle cell and neutropenic sepsis Requesting required investigations and maintaining patients notes Liaising with other specialities e.g. microbiology, radiology, renal, respiratory as required Managing ward inpatients by working closely with the medical and nursing teams. Participate in an on call rota across haematology and oncology
