The department	<p>Queen Elizabeth Hospital Birmingham has a record of excellence in treating trauma, as a regional centre for major trauma and the primary receiving hospital for all of Britain's serious military casualties.</p> <p>The department is one of the largest and busiest major trauma centres in the UK.</p> <p>The department offers the opportunity to work in a multidisciplinary, civilian and military team at the very forefront of trauma and orthopaedic surgery.</p> <p>The National Institute for Health Research (NIHR) Centre for Surgical Reconstruction and Microbiology has been established at the hospital.</p> <p>The total investment of £20 million will be used to help bring military and civilian trauma surgeons and scientists together to share innovation in medical research and advanced clinical practice in the battlefield, benefiting all trauma patients in the NHS at an early stage of injury.</p>
